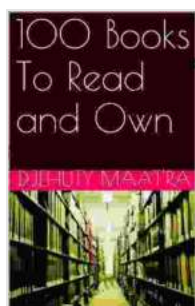

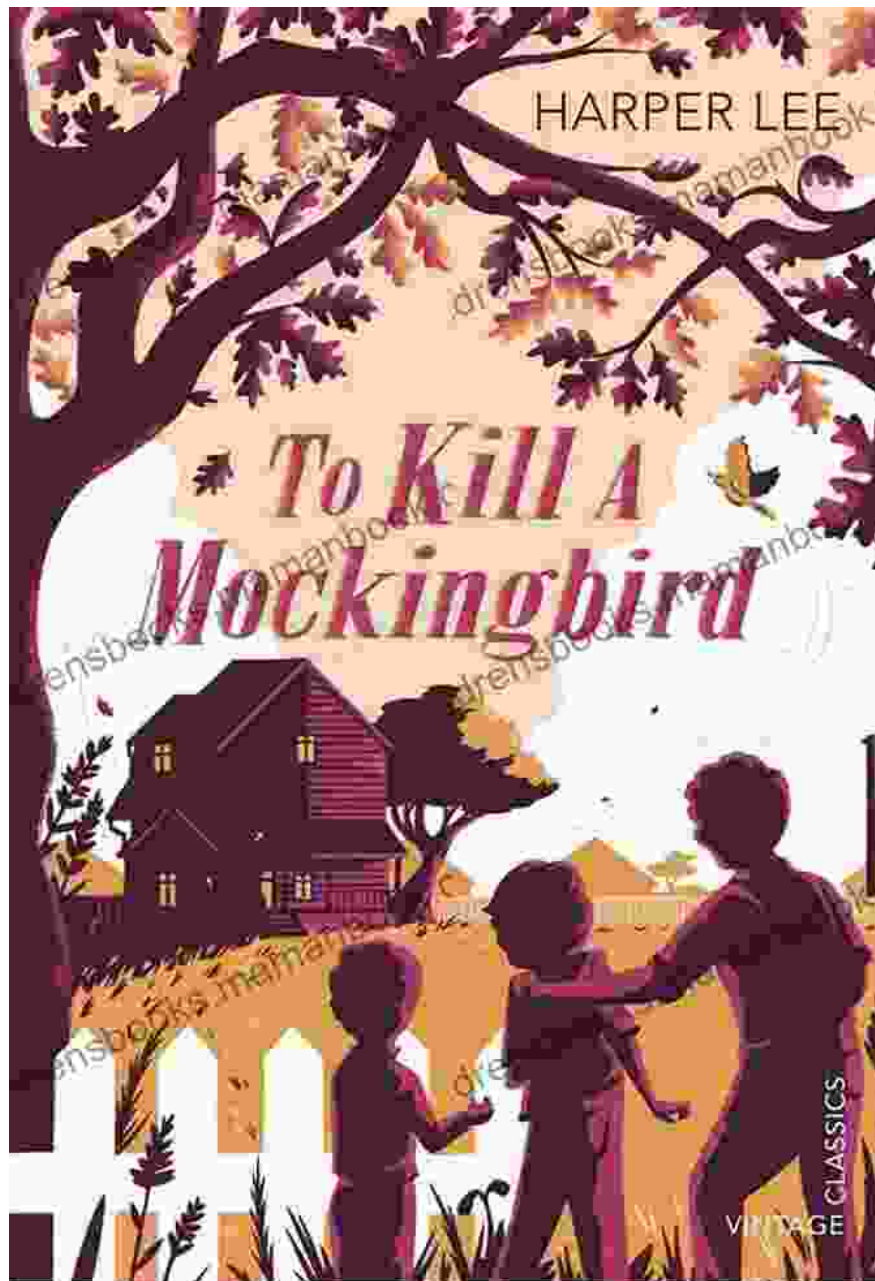

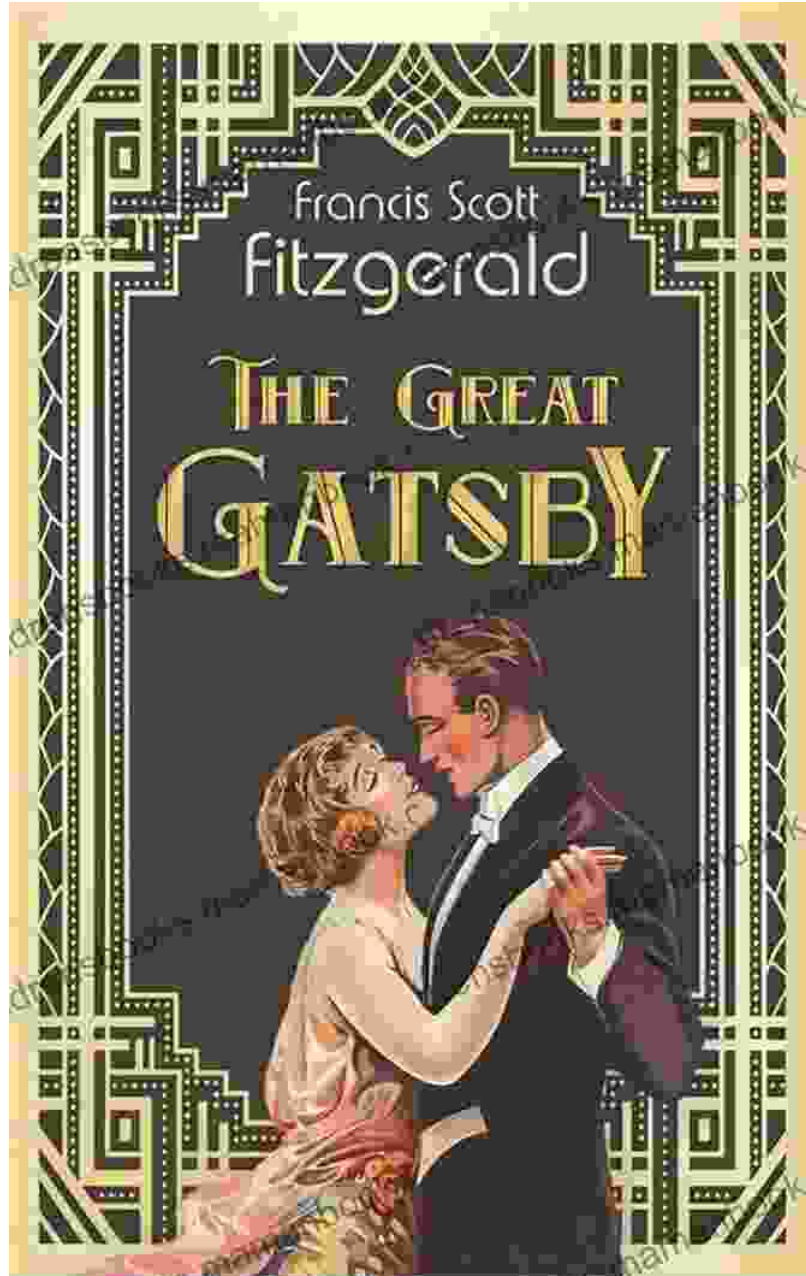
1. To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee

2. The Great Gatsby by F. Scott Fitzgerald

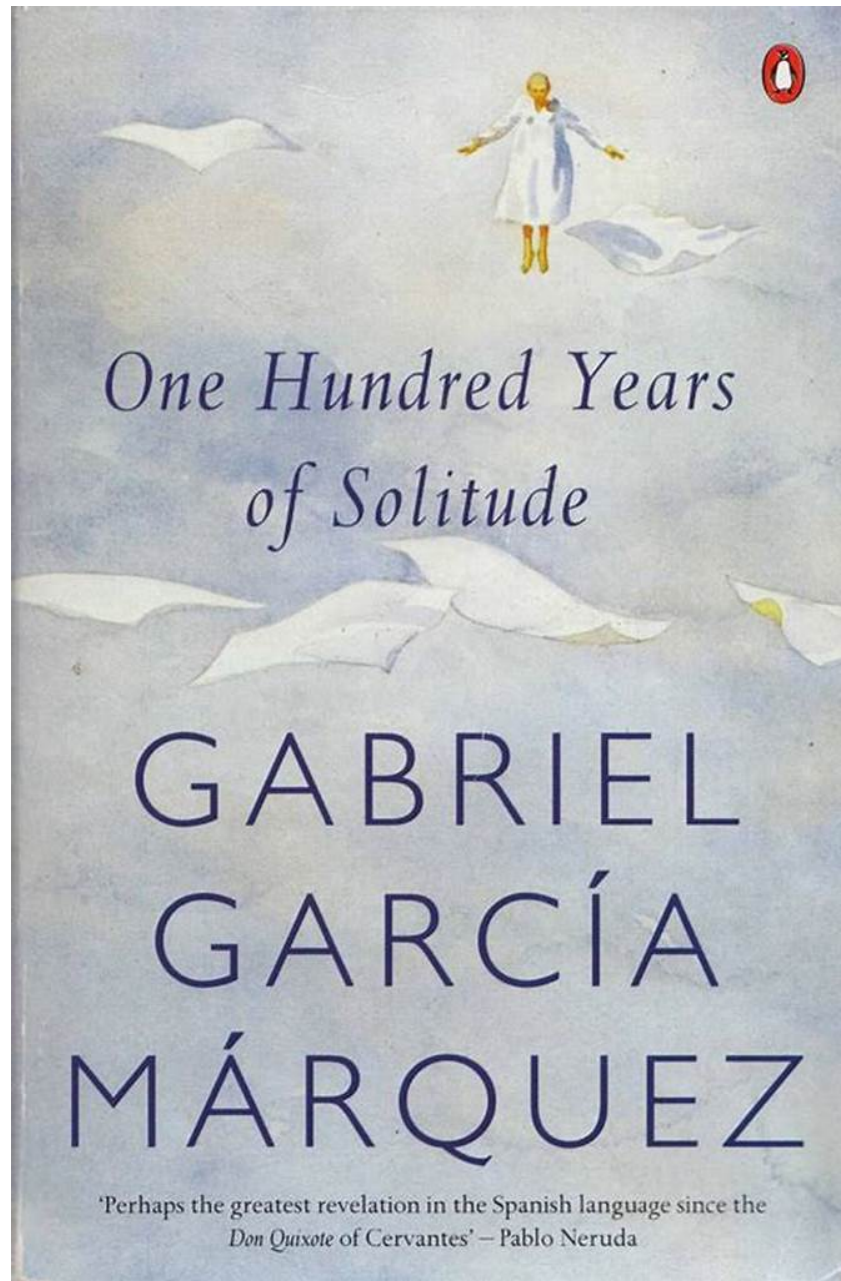
This classic American novel tells the story of Jay Gatsby, a self-made millionaire who throws lavish parties in an attempt to win back his lost love, Daisy Buchanan.



3. One Hundred Years of Solitude by Gabriel García Márquez

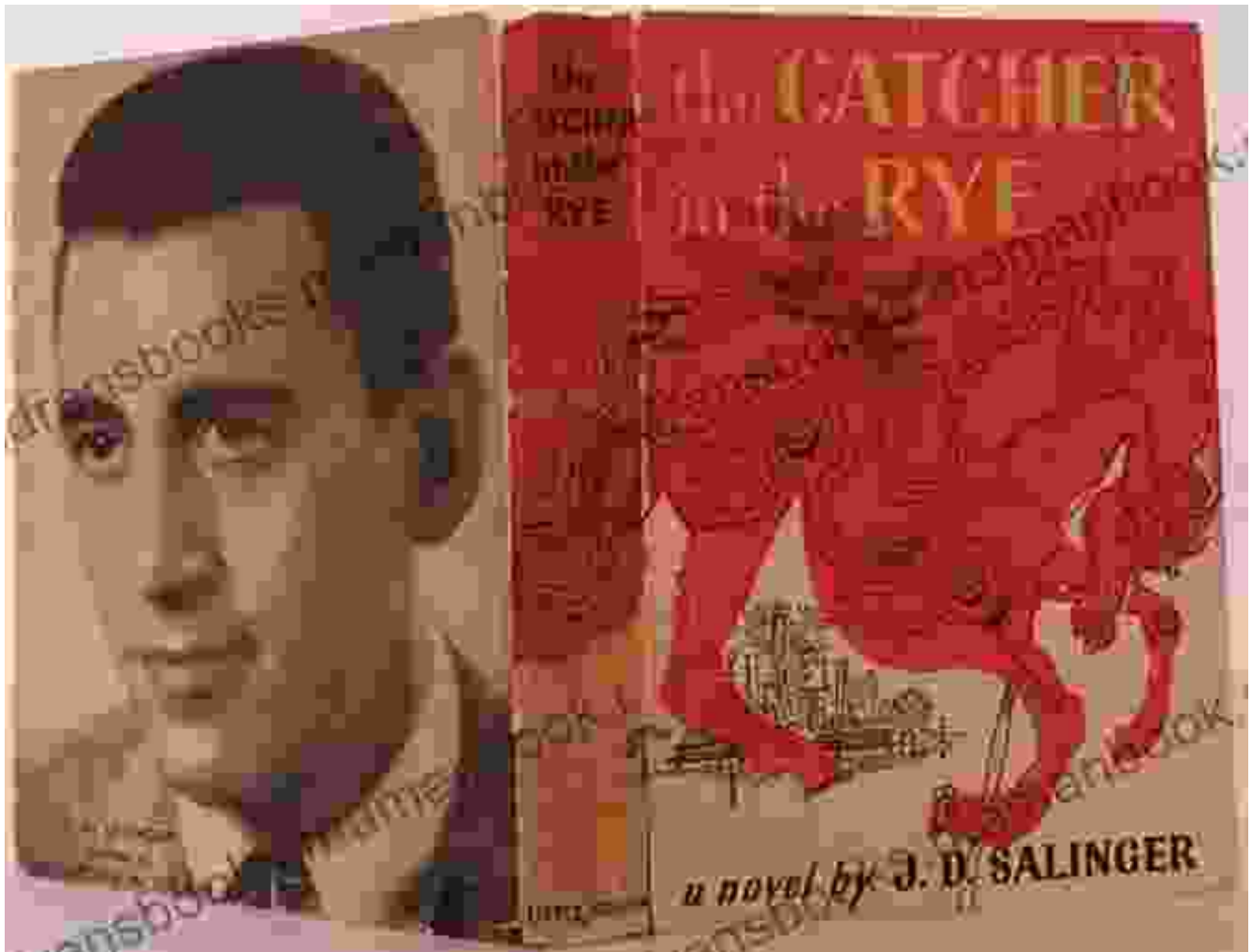
This magical realism novel tells the story of the Buendía family over seven generations. The book is a rich and complex exploration of love, loss, and

the human condition.



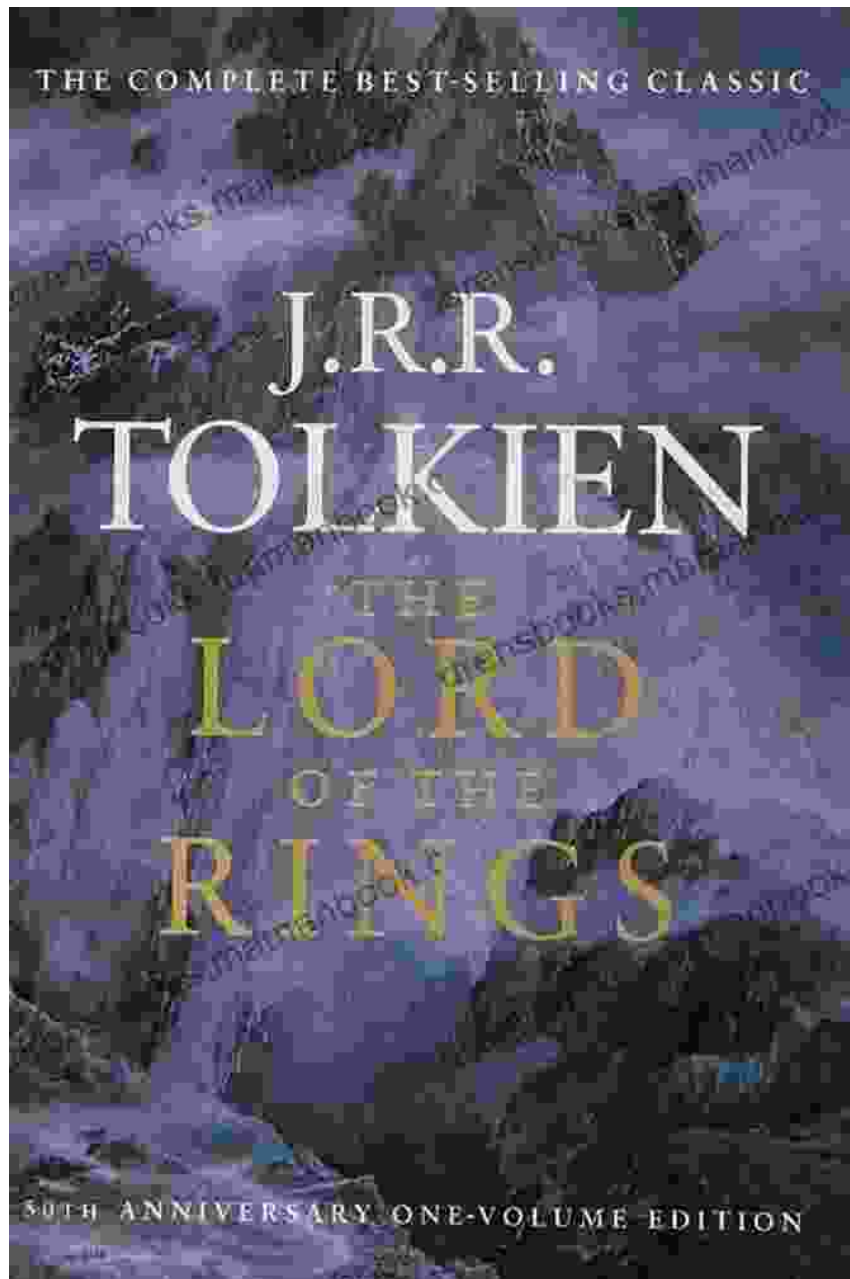
4. The Catcher in the Rye by J.D. Salinger

5. The Lord of the Rings by J.R.R. Tolkien

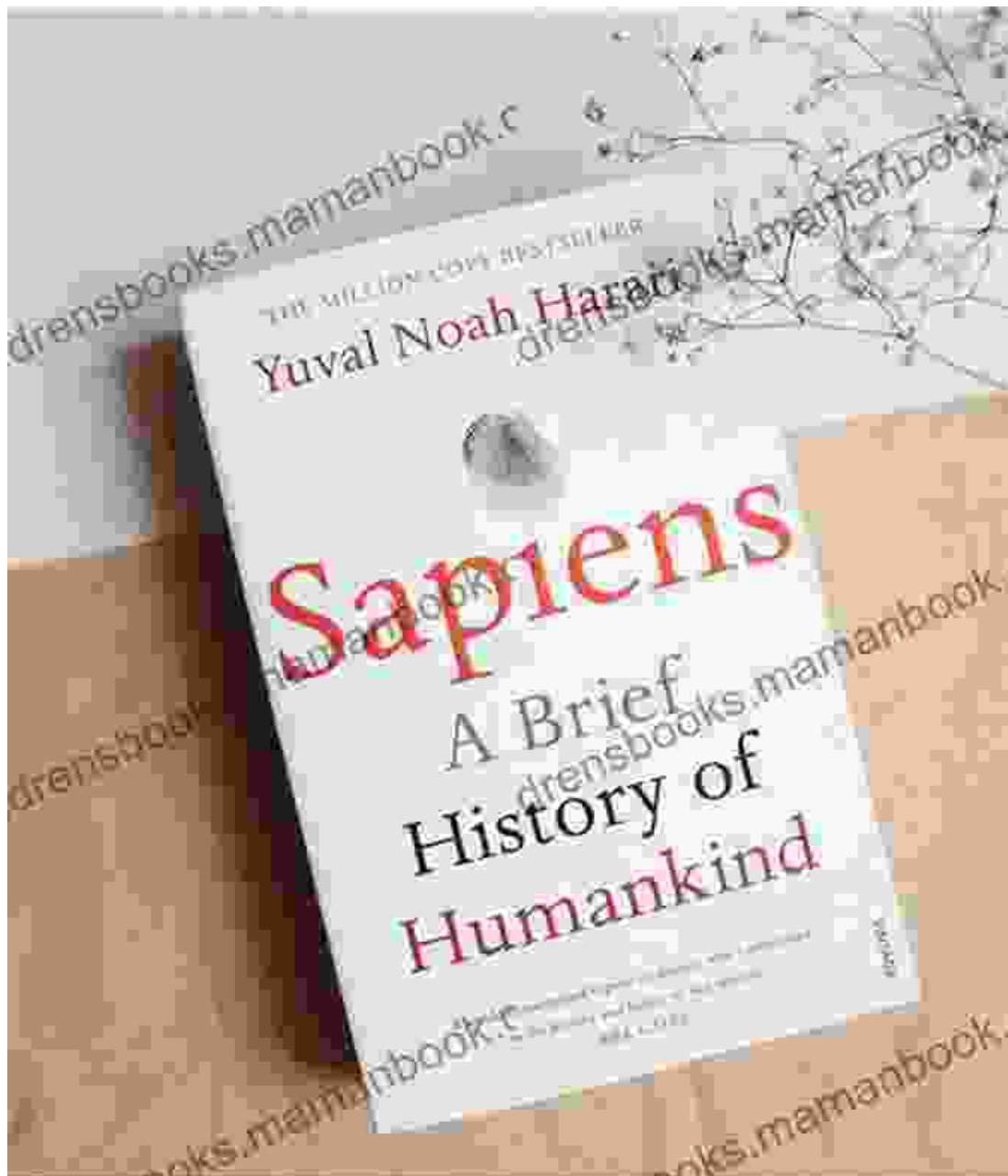

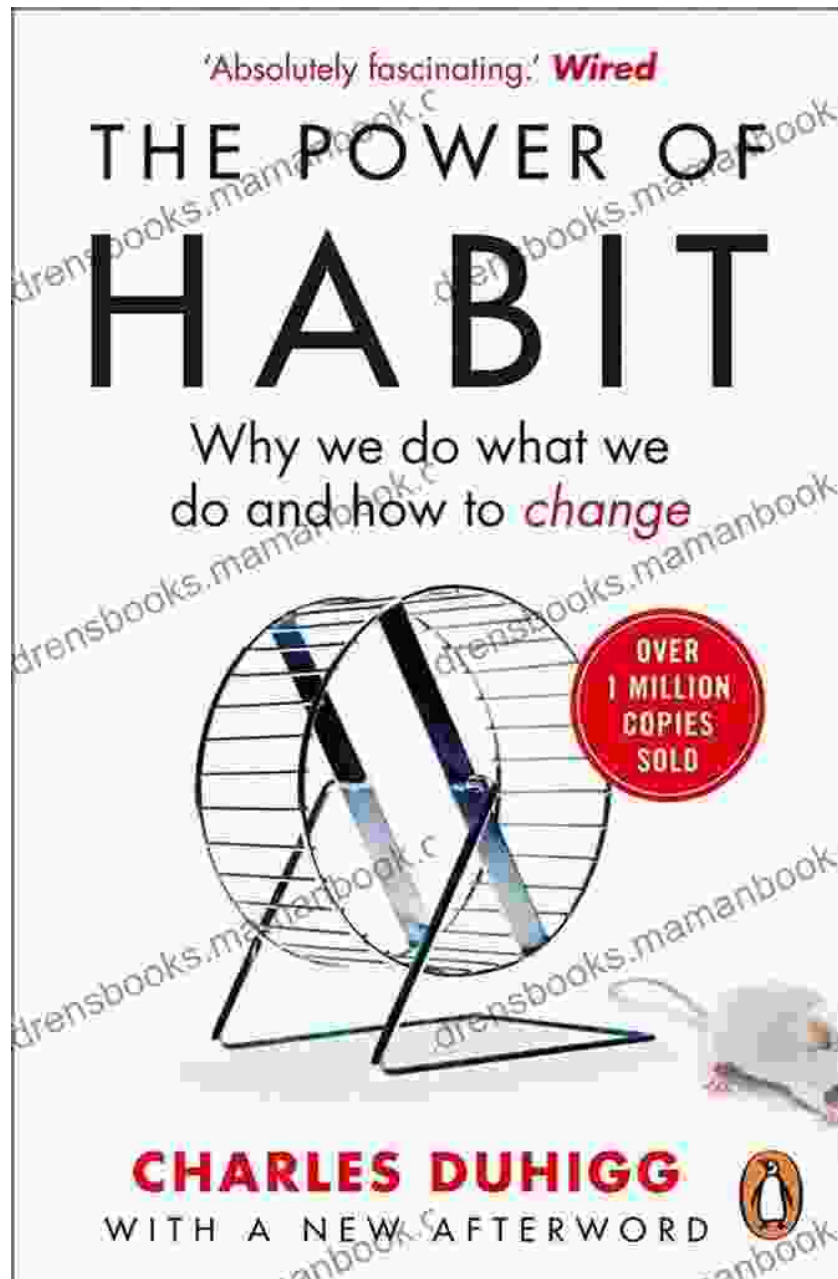
6. Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind by Yuval Noah Harari

This book provides a sweeping overview of human history, from our origins as a species to the present day. Harari explores the major forces that have shaped our evolution and offers insights into the future of humanity.



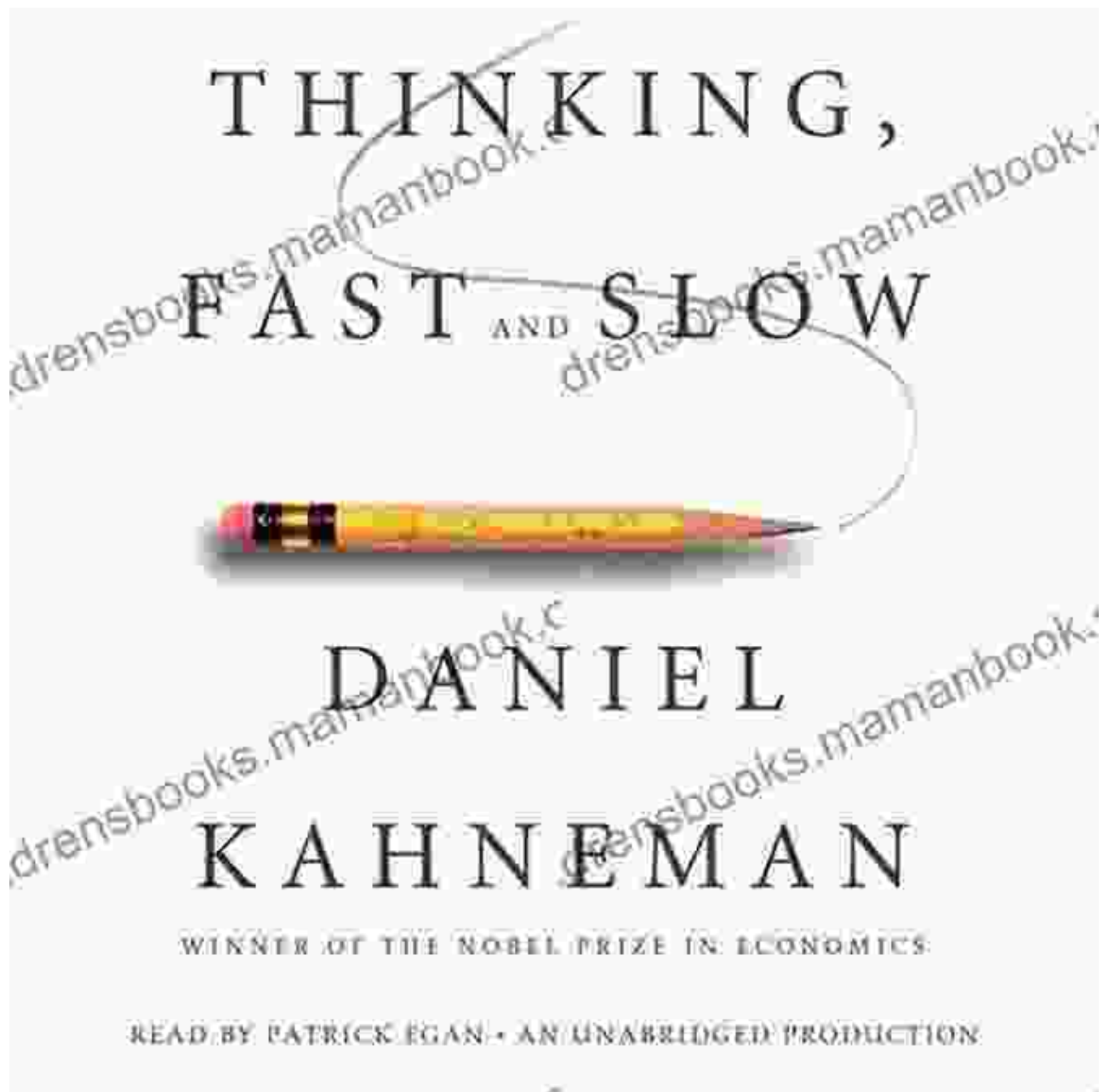
7. The Power of Habit by Charles Duhigg

This book explores the science of habit formation and offers practical advice on how to change our habits for the better.



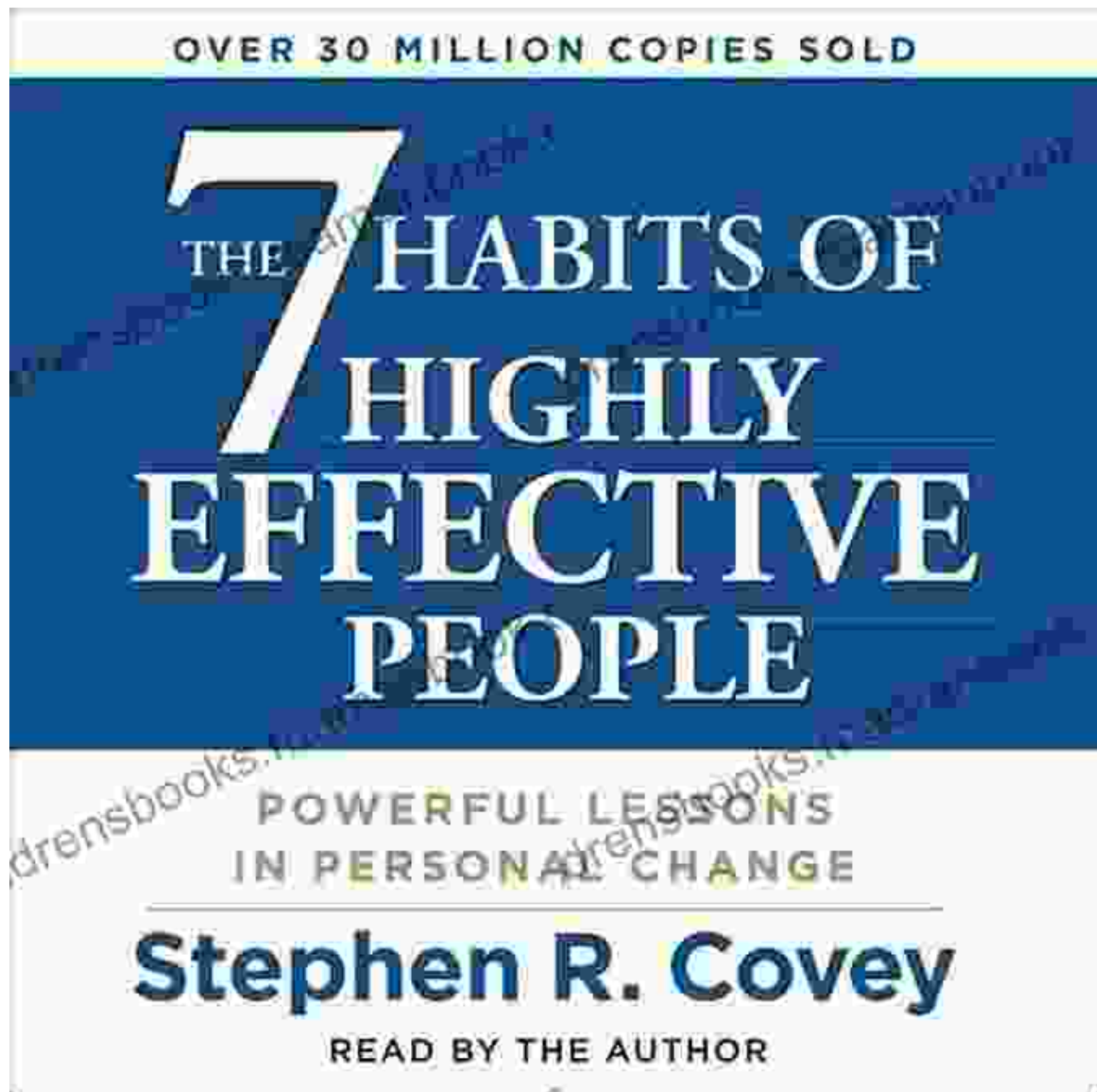
8. Thinking, Fast and Slow by Daniel Kahneman

This book explores the two systems of thinking that we use: System 1, which is fast, intuitive, and emotional, and System 2, which is slow, deliberative, and logical.



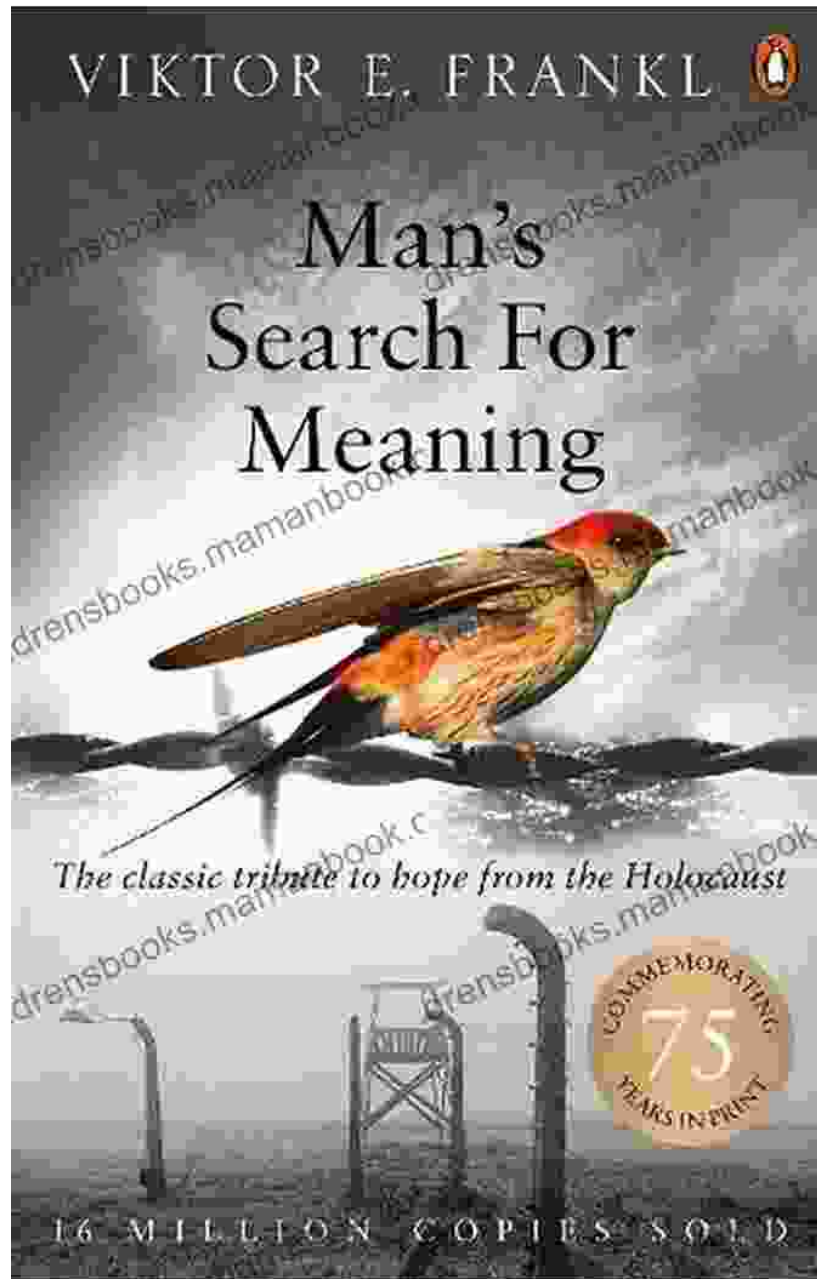
9. The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People by Stephen Covey

10. Man's Search for Meaning by Viktor Frankl

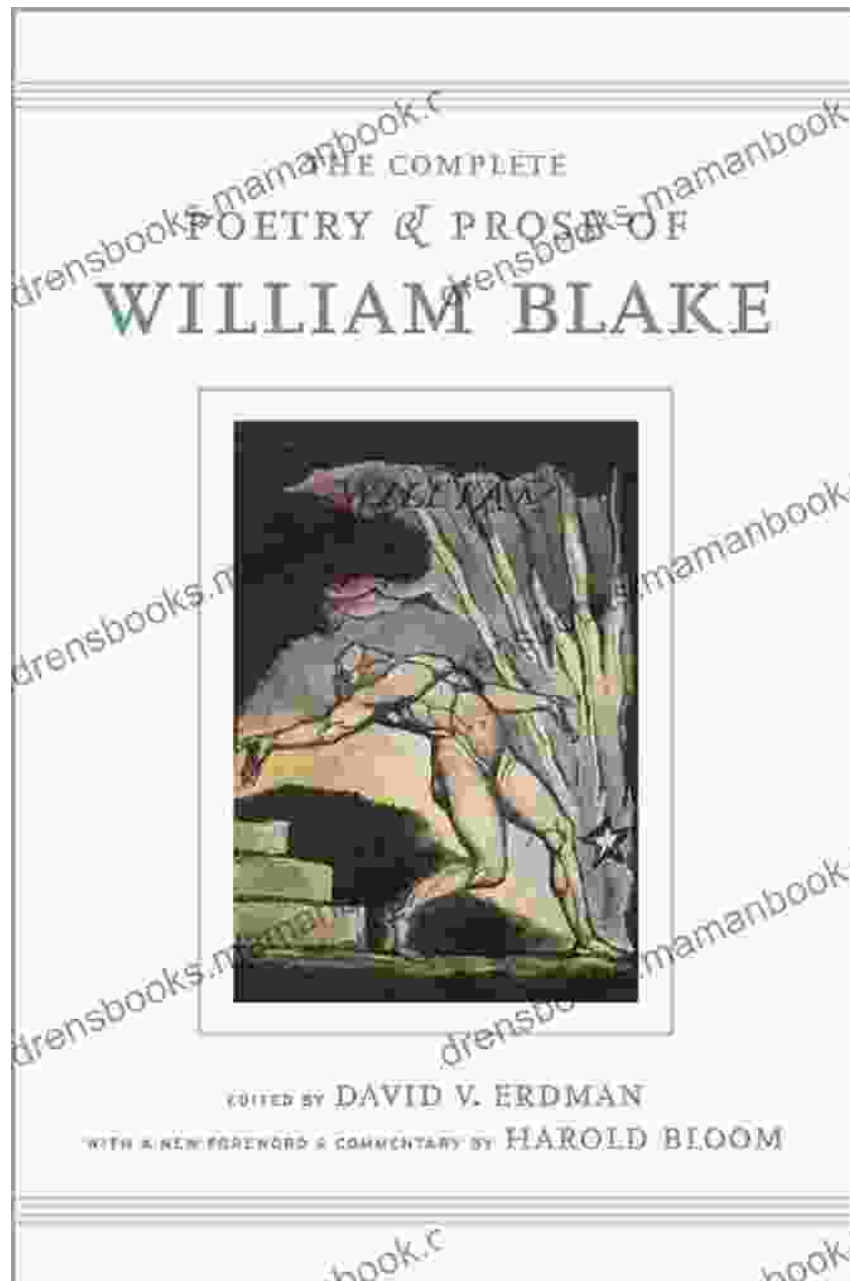
This book is a memoir by Viktor Frankl, a psychiatrist who survived the Holocaust. Frankl argues that the search for meaning is essential to human existence.

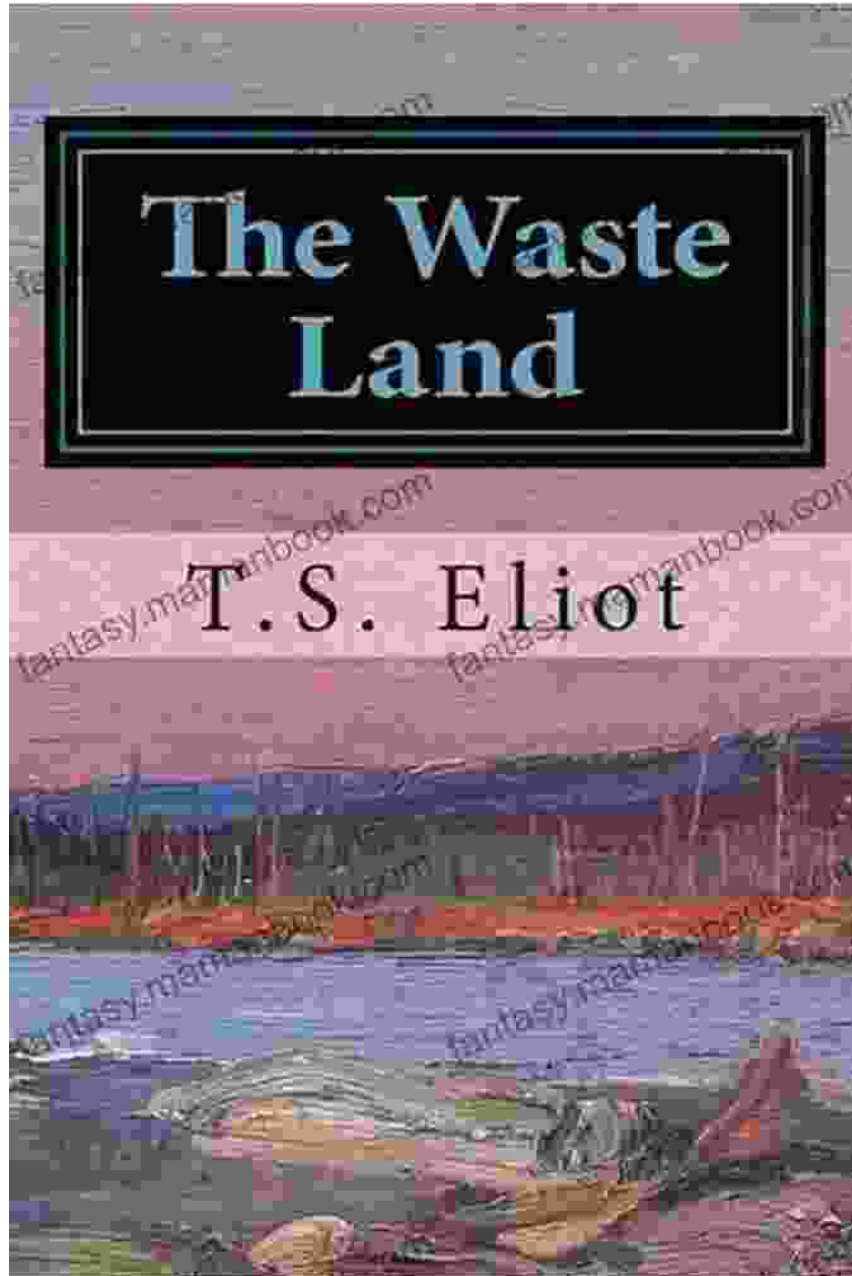
11. The Collected Poems of William Blake

William Blake was a visionary poet and artist who wrote some of the most beautiful and haunting poems in the English language.



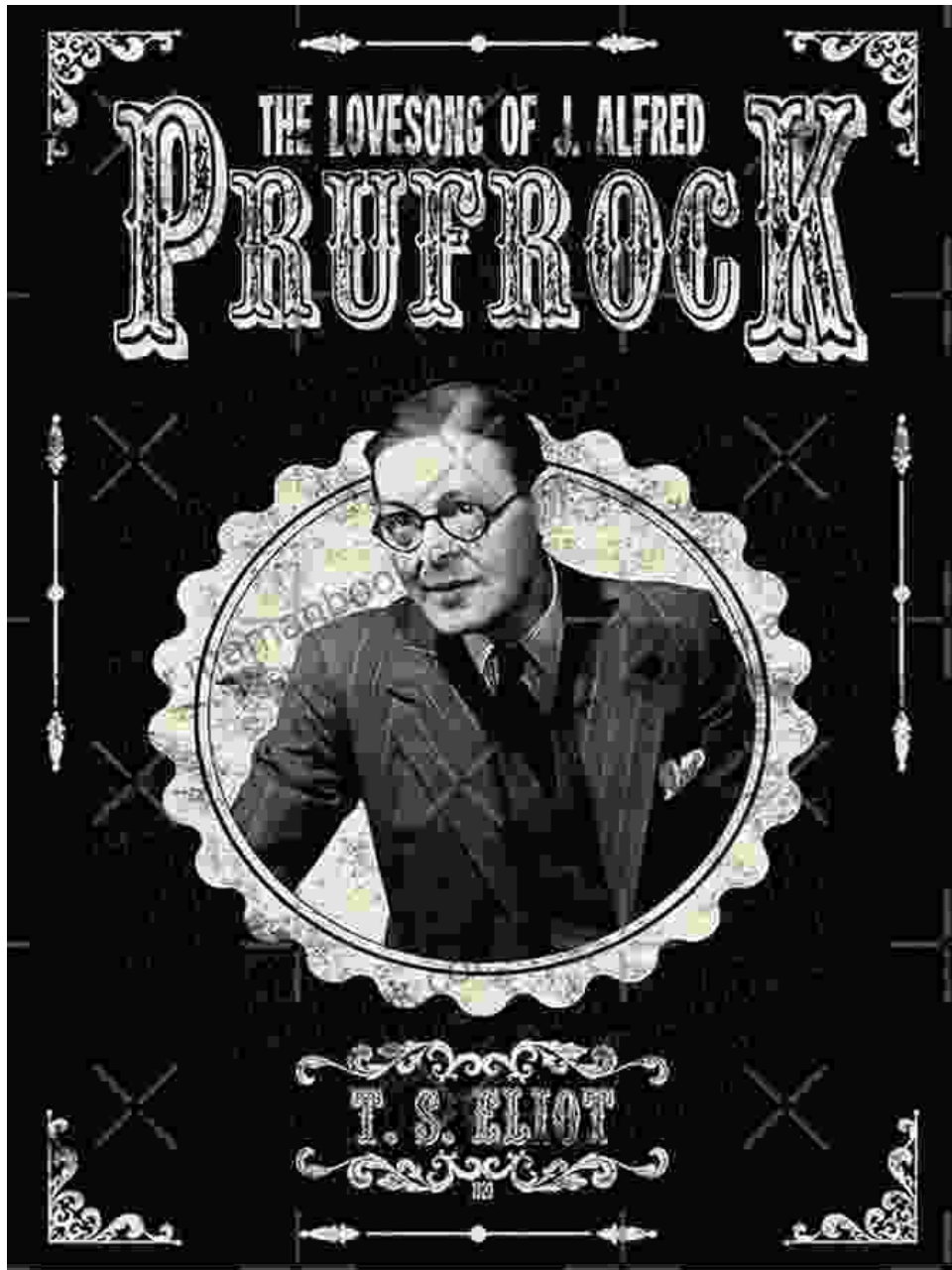
12. The Waste Land by T.S. Eliot

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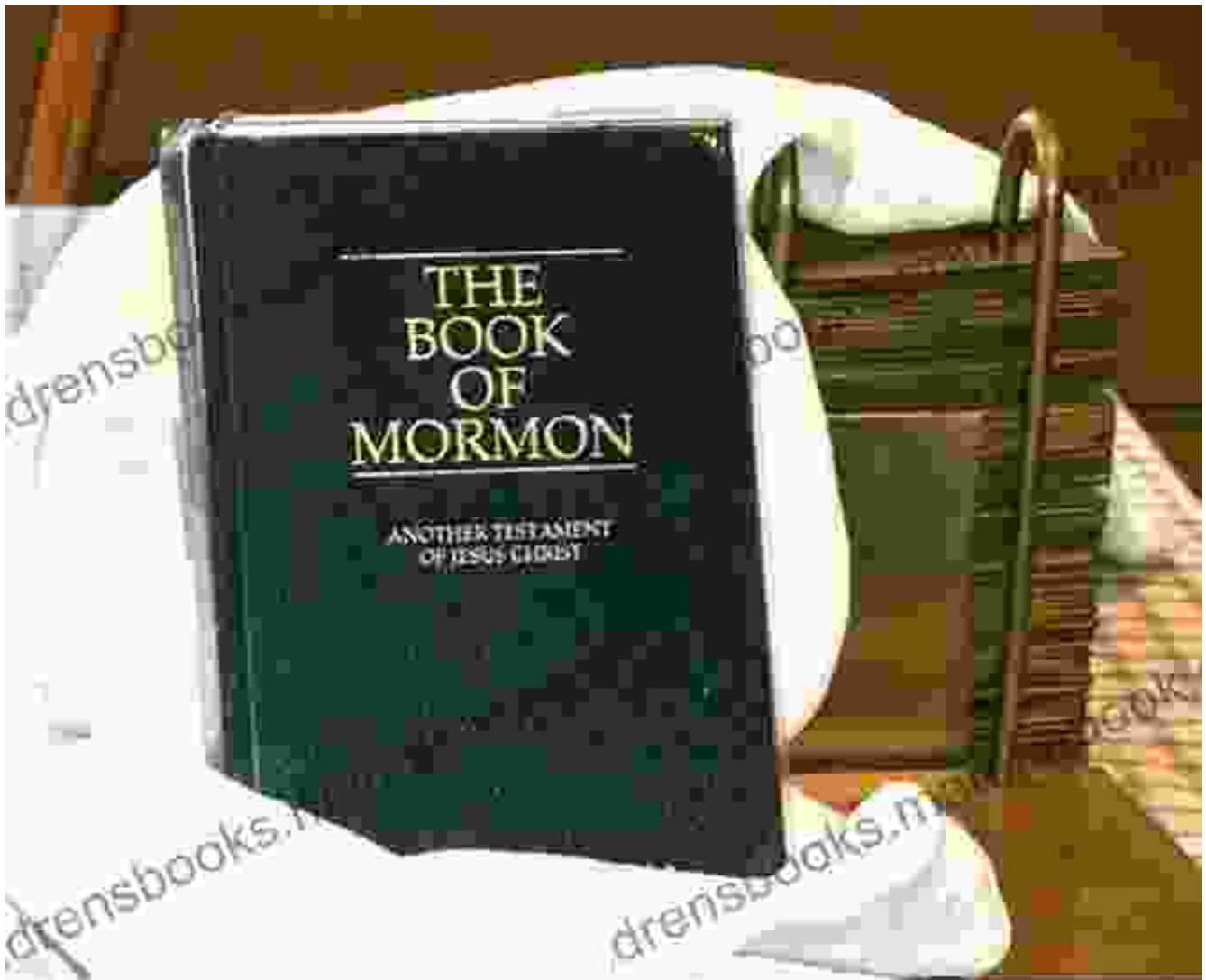
17. The Quran

The Quran is the holy book of Islam and is believed to be the word of God as revealed to the Prophet Muhammad.



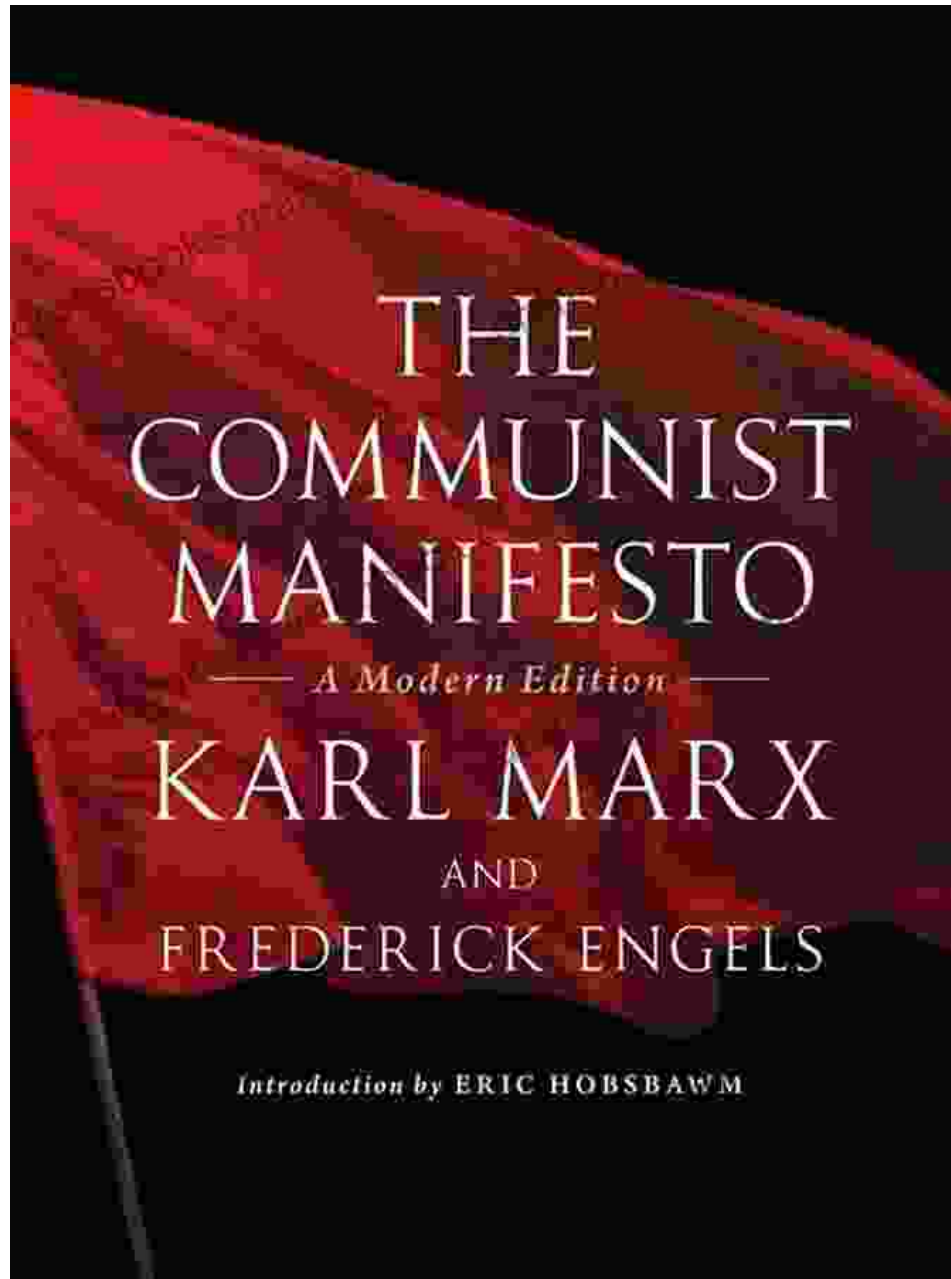
18. The Book of Mormon

The Book of Mormon is a religious text that is considered to be scripture by members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.



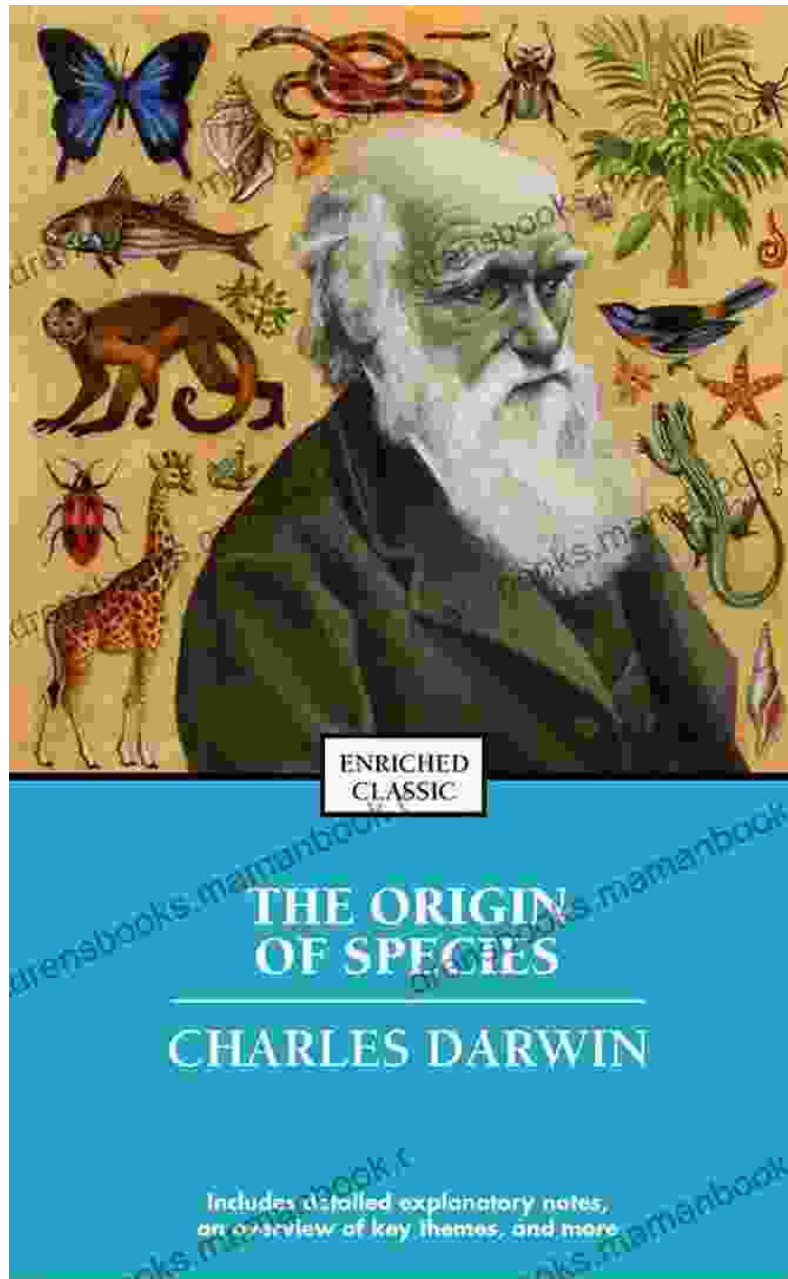
19. The Communist Manifesto by Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels

The Communist Manifesto is a political and economic treatise that is considered to be one of the most influential works in the history of socialism.



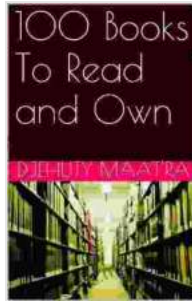
20. The Origin of Species by Charles Darwin
